DELEGATIONS

Nancy Oakley spoke on behalf of the Yukon Historical and Museums Association to request that the annual grant for taxes and other municipal charges for local museums be restored to their usual levels. She stressed that the proposed reduction to the grant will impact programs and services at the museums. Ms. Oakley acknowledged that they were given notice a year ago that the grant might be adjusted or capped for this budget year, but there was no consultation, no follow-up, and no indication of the extent to which the grant would be reduced. Before giving the bylaw third reading, she asked council members to consider the museums' value to the community and the role they play in informing both residents and visitors of the history of the area and in preserving artefacts, documents and other items that celebrate that history.

Jacob Heigers of Cormode and Dickson Construction advised that his firm submitted the low bid for the Design-Build project for widening the Robert Campbell Bridge. He stated that their bid was submitted in exact accordance with tender instructions, and was the lowest bid by more than \$130,000. Mr. Heigers advised that his company's review of the reports, correspondence and clarifications leads them to believe that award to Wildstone would be premature, contractually and financially erroneous, and not in the best interest of the City or its taxpayers. He stated that marginal technical issues are virtually impossible to pin down at the concept design stage, and pricing omissions that might exist in the concept design and bid should be evaluated in greater detail and balanced against the significant financial difference between the two bids. Mr. Heigers also stated that his firm finds it difficult to accept that the higher bid already incorporates a design that is fully developed and engineered to the extent that it will not change before final approval without significant additional work. It is the opinion of his firm that the comparison between the two bids is not yet significant enough to justify final award. Mr. Heigers requested that a decision regarding this contract award be delayed by two weeks in order to provide an opportunity for his firm to respond in greater detail to comments raised in the administrative and Stantec reports. Alternatively, he requested that the project be awarded to Cormode and Dickson Construction.

Administration confirmed that if council opts to cancel this contract and direct that the tender be reissued, administration would recommend separate tenders for the design and build portions of the project.

Bob Walker, a member of the Whitehorse Curling Club, encouraged Council to consider all the values the club brings to the community, including youth programs, league activities, and the economic spin-off from hosted events. He especially asked Council to consider that the utility costs and the small staff required for their operations are paid for by club fees. Mr. Walker suggested that one size does not fit all when it comes to calculating grants, fees or lease rates, and requiring a 50% return is not sustainable and therefore could end up being a lose-lose proposition for both the City and the club. He asked Council to keep these issues in mind when they vote on the Curling Club lease.

Marianne Darragh advised that she has no objections to the application as proposed, but indicated that she has some concerns regarding the City's process. She noted that she lives within 1,000 metres of the development area, but was not directly notified of the application, and also expressed concern regarding the lack of a comprehensive quarry plan for the area.

Travis Ulrich of Yellow Truck Excavating advised Council that the application to approve a quarry operation at this location has been going on for more than five years. The application has included two separate reviews under the Yukon Environmental and Socio-economic Assessment Act, and public notification has been a part of every step in the process. Mr. Ulrich suggested that there has been sufficient public notice and plenty of time for comment.

Isabelle Gagnon questioned if quarry operations should be classified as light industrial, and suggested that the notification area for this application should have been widened to include the Canyon Crescent area. Ms. Gagnon also expressed concern about the extent of the deforestation that is being proposed for this application.

Sandy Helland addressed the Committee to indicate that running the transit service until 10:00 p.m. is still not late enough for some people, particularly late-shift employees and students, and suggested that the buses should run until midnight. Ms. Helland also raised a concern with statutory holiday closures at the Canada Games Centre and how it affects staff, businesses and travellers. She suggested that the City is putting too much emphasis on Whistle Bend and not enough on amenities. The Committee advised Ms. Helland that when the new bus schedule is implemented the buses will be running until 10:20 p.m., and that the closure of the Canada Games Centre on statutory holidays is for budgetary reasons.

Cristina Pekarik addressed the Committee to note that she is still a supporter of Mount Sima and has been doing some research on what could be done to keep the ski hill in operation. Ms. Pekarik acknowledged that Mount Sima is different from other City facilities as it is not directly owned and operated like the Canada Games Centre. Ms. Pekarik encouraged Council take cautious steps in trying to preserve the Hill for winter operations, noting that there are outstanding questions about what went wrong. She suggested that the City should define its role when it comes to supporting facilities like Mount Sima, but acknowledged that with the summits being closed maybe the moment was lost.

He questioned whether the proposed cuts are the right place for Council to try and balance a large budget, and reiterated that Council must consider what is good value for the community. Mr. Halliday advised that the Board is trying to manage a valuable asset and provide a valuable service with a limited budget, and encouraged Council to reconsider these cuts.
