NEW AND UNFINISHED BUSINESS

The long-term vision for development in Whitehorse is established in the Official Community Plan, with the policy on residential development being to promote a city-wide compact development pattern. In 2019, Council adopted *Attainable Housing* as one of its six Strategic Priorities.

The proposed Housing Development Incentives Policy is meant to build on the success of the original Development Incentives Policy and more closely align with municipal priorities and goals. This will be done by targeting assistance to residential projects that address gaps in the housing continuum or increase development in targeted locations.

The proposed policy targets assistance towards supportive housing and private market rental housing projects. It continues the ten-year tax grant for rental or supportive housing projects of four or more units that was established in the existing policy, and expands the assistance available for these types of projects by also waiving the Development Cost Charges that would normally apply.

In particular areas of the city, the proposed policy also encourages developers and property owners to take greater advantage of the density allowed on their lots under the Zoning Bylaw. This includes areas close to amenities and areas that are already zoned for medium or high density residential development.

"Creating attainable housing for citizens is a priority for the City and is supported in Council's Strategic Priorities, the Sustainability Plan, and the Official Community Plan.

The policy aligns with municipal priorities and goals by targeting assistance to residential projects that either: (a) address gaps in the housing continuum; or (b) increase development in targeted locations.

In practice, this policy will provide financial incentives for residential developments that provide rental or supportive housing, smaller, high density residential units, and residential units located near community services, such as schools, parks, and commercial centres.

Supportive housing and private market rental housing are identified as a gap in the housing continuum in the *Yukon Housing Action Plan*. Providing density in neighbourhoods supports the viability of community services such as schools, and commercial centres, and ensures that City services and infrastructure are used more efficiently.

Financial support for housing will be accomplished primarily through incentives in the form of Development Cost Charge reductions and/or ten-year tax grants.

Development Cost Charge reductions are an upfront financial benefit that can reduce the development cost of market housing, and can be passed on to homeowners.

Tax grants provide a long term benefit for rental and supportive housing projects by reducing operating costs.

For greater certainty, in the case of a mixed-use development, the City will only provide financial incentives for residential components of the development."

1. Amend 2019 – 2022 Umbrella Capital Budget Bylaw

Late in December 2019 council authorized a budget increase and construction contract award for the Mount McIntyre Ski Bridge repair project. This budget increase was inadvertently omitted from the Umbrella Capital Budget Amendment Bylaw that came forward in January of this year. In accordance with the *Municipal Act*, and the 2019 to 2022 Capital Budget Bylaw, an amendment to the umbrella bylaw is required to capture the total number of amendments made to the capital budget in 2019.

The recommendation of the Corporate Services Committee is

THAT Bylaw 2020-13, a bylaw to amend the 2019 to 2022 Umbrella Capital Budget Amendment Bylaw, be brought forward for consideration under the bylaw process.

2. Procurement Policy – For Information Only

The City's Purchasing and Sales Policy is currently out of date and insufficient as a guide for the procurement process as there have been changes in procurement law since the current policy was adopted. Additionally, global trends with procurement now include environmental, social and economic factors. The proposed Procurement Policy aims at ensuring a consistent, fair, transparent and publicly available process while providing preference to local businesses. It was formulated using the principles of compliance, access, transparency, fairness, best value, efficient and effective procurement, local procurement, and sustainable procurement.

Representatives from the Whitehorse Chamber of Commerce addressed the Committee to state that the policy as written does not support local business and therefore does not provide value to the local economy. They also raised concerns with the provisions for percentage incentives for local businesses and the alteration of council's role in the procurement process.

Kirk Cameron also spoke against the changes to council's role in the procurement process. He suggested that legal advice is needed before proceeding with a policy that moves responsibility for decision making on procurement contracting from council to the unelected and non-accountable City administration.

Following discussion on several specific aspects of the proposed policy, the Committee chair polled Committee members and then ruled that this matter is not ready to come forward to council. The Committee will have further discussions with administration to determine next steps.

3. Council Summaries for 2019

The Council Procedures Bylaw requires administration to annually provide summary reports on the attendance, expense claims, travel and voting records for each member of council. These reports are intended to provide a report card on the activities of council members and contribute to transparency with respect to the conduct of council. The summary reports for the 2019 calendar year provide details for all council members with respect to these issues.

Your Worship, the City Planning Committee respectfully submits the following report:

1. **Zoning Amendment Issues** – For Information Only

Barbara Scheck addressed the Committee to express concerns regarding the rezoning process, specifically with respect to the recent rezoning on Rhine Way and Range Road in the Takhini Neighbourhood. She asked why both the boundary alignment and the zoning change were considered together as one application, and questioned the rationale for not having a second public hearing after the developer revised the plans for the development. Ms. Scheck also expressed concern that the developer could make more changes to the plan now that the rezoning process is complete.

2. Renaming College Drive to University Drive

Yukon College has requested that the public portion of the existing College Drive be renamed as University Drive to coincide with Yukon University's official launch. The proposed name is compliant with the requirements of the Municipal Addressing and

Naming Policy and associated Guidelines and Procedures. The Development Review Committee reviewed the proposed name change and no concerns were identified.

The recommendation of the City Planning Committee is

THAT Bylaw 2020-09, a bylaw to rename College Drive as University Drive, be brought forward for consideration under the bylaw process.

CITY OF WHITEHORSE BYLAW 2020-08

A bylaw to authorize a local improvement charge for urban electrification

WHEREAS in 1989 council approved the concept of assisting taxpayers to bring electrical service to their property via the imposition of a local improvement charge; and

WHEREAS the owners of the property located at LOT 28 Ravens Ridge Subdivision, 190 War Eagle Way, have applied under the Urban Electrification Program for a local improvement to assist them in providing power to the property; and

WHEREAS sections 267 to 271 of the *Municipal Act* require that a bylaw to provide for and authorize a local improvement will contain specific information pertaining to the local improvement and the procedures to be followed in passing the bylaw; and

WHEREAS the actual cost of the said construction is estimated to be \$7,980.00 of which \$7,980.00 will be raised by way of a special tax assessment, and

WHEREAS in order to construct and complete the project it will be necessary to fund up to the sum of \$7,980.00 from the City; and

WHEREAS the estimated life of the project exceeds ten years;

NOW THEREFORE the council of the municipality of the City of Whitehorse, in open meeting assembled, hereby ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- A work of local improvement, being the electrification of the property described as Lot 28 Ravens Ridge Subdivision, Plan 2013-0080, Roll #3550002800, property class RSC, located at 190 War Eagle Way, is hereby authorized.
- 2. The parcel of land benefiting from this work of local improvement is as set out in section 1 of this bylaw.
- 3. The total cost of the local improvement has been determined by ATCO Electric Yukon.
- 4. The cost of the work is to be paid for by way of a special assessment to be levied on the parcel described in section 1 of this bylaw.
- 5. For the purposes aforesaid, the sum of up to \$7,980.00 is to be funded by the City at large.
- 6. The sum of \$7,980.00 is to be collected by way of a special assessment as provided in section 7 of this bylaw.
- 7. There is hereby imposed on the land described in section 1 of this bylaw a special assessment under the *Assessment and Taxation Act*. This equates to an annual fee in the amount of \$981.41 for each of ten years. This sum is the amount necessary to pay the annual amount of interest and principal falling due in each year, computed at the prime business rate of 3.95% as at January 22, 2020. The said special assessment shall be in addition to all other rates and taxes.

Local Improvement for Urban Electrification Bylaw 2020-08

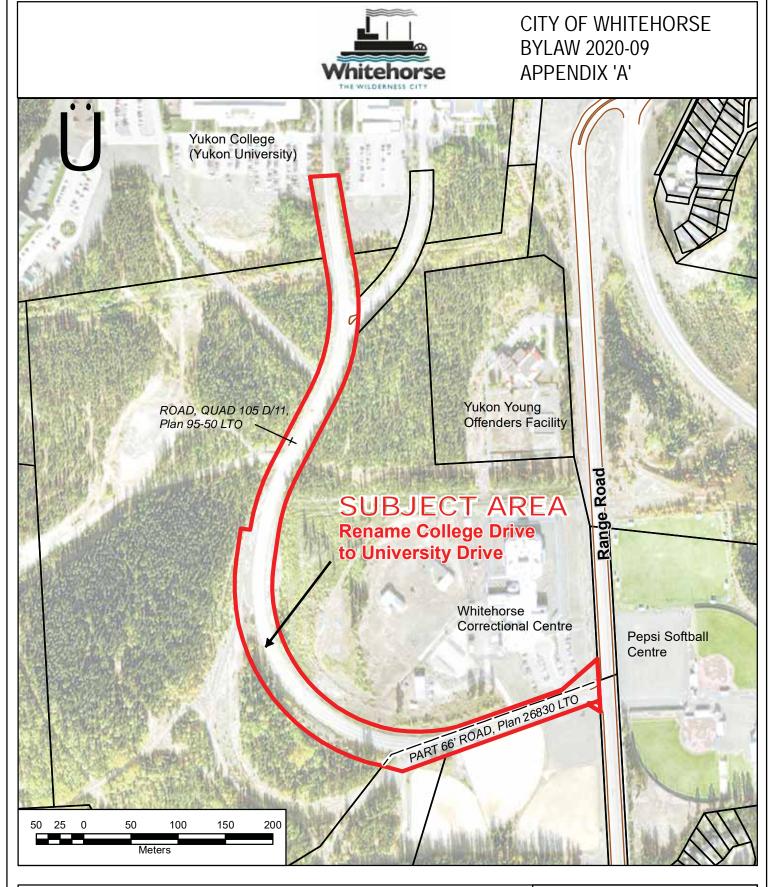
- (1) The property owners have the option of paying the total property charge prior to its due date, or of paying the equal annual instalments each of ten years, commencing on July 2, 2021.
- (2) The property owners may reduce the balance owing on the total property charge by making a lump sum payment in any year during the life of the bylaw. Such lump sum payments shall be accepted only in the month of January each year.
- (3) The property owners may also pay off the balance owing at any point during the ten-year life of the bylaw.
- 8. The provisions of this bylaw shall come into full force and effect upon final passage thereof.
