- 2. AND THAT City Council direct Administration to communicate to those who have ad requests in queue that the ads will need to be resubmitted and considered under the new policy once developed with the exception of ads that have already bene approved to be placed on an ongoing basis.

Please be advised there will be a Public Hearing at the Regular Council Meeting of October 24, 2022, to hear from interested parties related to the following Zoning Bylaw amendment:

Bylaw 2022-32, a bylaw to amend the zoning of a 25.80 hectare parcel of vacant Commissioner's land comprising Phases 10 and 11 of Whistle Bend, from FP – Future Planning to public and residential zones.

Phases 10 and 11 are located at the most westerly area of Whistle Bend, adjacent to Phases 8 and 9. Phases 10 and 11 are proposed to be well connected to the rest of the Whistle Bend neighbourhood through trails and active transportation routes and therefore are planned at a low-to-medium density.

Phase 10 will tentatively provide 117 lots for single-family homes or duplexes and 10 multi-family lots. Additionally, Phase 10 will tentatively provide one Greenbelt lot, one Parks and Recreation lot, and one Public Services lot. Phase 11 will tentatively include 93 single-family lots and four multi-family lots.

Bylaw 2022-32 received First Reading on September 26, 2022. Notices were published in the Whitehorse Star and Yukon News on September 30, 2022 and October 7, 2022. Property owners within 100 meters were notified by mail and the Government of Yukon Land Management Branch, Kwanlin Dün First Nation, and Ta'an Kwäch'än Council were notified by email.

1. Upcoming Procurements – For Information Only

In accordance with the Procurement Policy, a list of forthcoming procurements with an anticipated value greater than \$100,000 must be provided to Council on a bi-monthly basis. Managers have been asked to review their capital projects and operating requirements for the period of November and December 2022.

Administration responded to questions related to scrap metal processing and the water monitoring contract.

2. Council 2023 Annual Schedule and Committee Appointments

To facilitate the scheduling of special events and planned recesses, each fall Council approves the schedule for Standing Committee and Regular Council meetings for the coming calendar year.

3. Fall Recreation Grant

Council policy governs the allocation of recreation grants. The Recreation Grant Task Force met on September 26 to discuss the applications and compile recommendations for funding in accordance with the Recreation Grant Policy.

A total of \$250,000 is available for two granting sessions in 2022. The funding available for this session for all Recreation Grant categories is \$75,000 plus any refunds received.

The Committee Members posed questions related to operation and maintenance requests and with respect to the allocation of funds for the spring and fall.

The recommendation of the Corporate Services Committee is

The multi-department review committee met Thursday, September 22, 2022 to evaluate eligible Festival and Special Event Grant applications received by the August 31, 2022 deadline for projects occurring from January 1 to December 31, 2023.

\$50,000 is available to support applications in this intake. A total of 11 applications were received, all of which were deemed eligible. Each application was considered by the assessment review committee utilizing the established criteria for the purpose of recommending both cash and in-kind support.

The recommendation of the Corporate Services Committee is

That Council approve recommendations for the Festival and Special Event Grant Fund applications with funding from the 2023 budget.

1. Zoning Amendment - Whistle Bend Phase 12 & 13

The basic concept for Whistle Bend was developed in 2006 and a master plan for the neighbourhood was approved in 2009 for the development of phases 1 to 7. In 2020, the City completed the planning and preliminary engineering work for three new development areas in Whistle Bend: Areas A, B, and C. Area C was selected as the next development area after the completion of the initial seven phases. The two remaining phases of Area C to be zoned, Phases 10 and 11, are currently proceeding through the rezoning process.

An application to amend the zoning of a 16.2 hectares of vacant Commissioner's land comprising Phase 12 and Phase 13 of Whistle Bend, from FP – Future Planning, residential, and public zones to residential, mixed-use, and public zones to allow for a range and mix of commercial and residential developments.

Committee Members raised questions and concerns related to traffic management, trails and design for the area; Administration committed to provide responses.

The recommendation of the City Planning Committee is

THAT Council direct that Bylaw 2022-43, a bylaw to amend the zoning of a 16.2 hectares of vacant Commissioner's land comprising Phases 12 and 13 of Whistle Bend, be brought forward for consideration under the bylaw process.

1. <u>Snow and Ice Control Program Updates</u>

The Snow and Ice Control Policy (SICP) identifies the intent of the City's winter maintenance operations and establishes the priorities and service levels for snow and ice control activities. The policy was last updated in January 2022 to include new additions to the City network of priority trails. Some of the challenges under the existing SICP can be addressed through updating associated policies and bylaws such as the Maintenance Bylaw and Trail Maintenance Bylaw.

Population growth, demographic change, and climate change have all affected the City's snow and ice control operations. Since the 2018/2019 season, the total snowfall accumulation for the Whitehorse area has risen from 143 cm to 268.5 cm without any significant permanent corresponding increase in fleet or resource capacity.

Committee Members discussed snow removal as it relates to trail use including alternatives that could improve accessibility for the community to use these trails during the winter months. The Committee Members noting intensification in the city, questioned how the city will manage snow clearing and also raised concerns related to snow removal for residents living in intensified areas such as Whistle Bend. Committee Members discussed priority routes and raised concerns related to snow removal for bus routes. Administration was asked to confirm the priority rating of two roads within Whistle Bend.

ADMINSTRATIVE NOTE

The recommendation of the City Operations Committee is

THAT Council approve the amendments to the Snow and Ice Control Policy 2021-05 and Trail Maintenance Policy 2021-02, as recommended; and

THAT Council direct that Bylaw 2022-44, a bylaw to amend the Maintenance Bylaw in accordance with the Snow and Ice Control Program Updates, be brought forward for consideration under the bylaw process.

2. <u>Heather Ashthorn – Raven Recycling Society Updates</u>

The Committee heard from Heather Ashthorn of Raven Recycling Society who provided an update on recycling, addressed the cost of recycling and spoke to planning considerations in preparation for the Extended Producer Responsibility regulatory framework identified by the Yukon Government.

3. Lee Hawkings – Snow and Ice Control Program Updates

Lee Hawkings addressed the Committee to suggest that the City change winter maintenance practices on active transportation routes. Mr. Hawkings expressed concerns with the lack of snow removal specifically in the Hamilton Boulevard and Elijah Smith trails and stated that current trail clearing does not meet the needs of cyclists or walkers. As an example, he offered that the City explore Finland's snow removal methods.

Your Worship, the Community Services Committee respectfully submits the following report.

1. Whitehorse North Trail Plan Update

The trail plan for Whitehorse North consists of a map that identifies existing trails, proposes trail use designations in accordance with the City of Whitehorse Trail Maintenance Policy, and identifies growth opportunities for new trail development.

The 2022 Whitehorse North Trail Plan provides staff and Council with a point of reference that will inform ongoing trail management and development to manage diverse trail needs within the Whitehorse North neighbourhood. To this end, the 2022 Whitehorse North Trail Plan designates existing motorized and non-motorized multi use trails, recommends these trails for ongoing maintenance, and identifies opportunities for future trail growth.

The Committee Members sought clarity on the impact of motorized trail use specifically related to the difference between ATV and snowmobiles. Administration provided answers to questions with respect to the percentage of motorized vs non motorized trail use and what the feedback was from the community regarding the trail plan.

The recommendation of the Community Services Committee is

THAT Council approve the 2022 Whitehorse North Trail Plan as a guiding document.

2. Jason Charlie and Ulrike Levins – Voices Influencing Change

As part of the Yukon Anti-Poverty Coalition, Jason Charlie and Ulrike Levins of Voices Influencing Change addressed the Committee Members. Mr. Charlie reflected on the impacts of colonization to First Nations and Mrs. Levins summarized the work of their organization. She also suggested three potential actions for change such as a "Good Will" style clothing store, a free store and reducing the timeline for building permits and inspections for those with affordable housing projects.

3. Chris Bullinger and Leila Srangi – Campaign 2000

The delegates spoke to their Pan - Canada organization working to end child and family poverty. They encouraged involving those with lived experiences in program design and provided examples of first steps.

4. Keith Lay – Whitehorse North Trail Plan Update

Keith Lay of the Active Trails Whitehorse Association addressed the Committee expressing concerns with the Whitehorse North Trail Plan. Mr. Lay raised concerns relating specifically to motorized trail use and requested that snowmobile users be prohibited from using specific trails. He also explained that he finds the City's bylaws confusing and feels users need a more equitable trail system.

5. <u>New Business – Small Business Week</u>

October 16th to October 22nd is Small Business week hosted by Whitehorse Chamber of Commerce. A Committee Member noted that this marks the 43rd annual small business week and that within the Yukon there are approximately 3100 small and medium sized businesses.

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There being no further business the meeting adjourned at 7:54pm.

CITY OF WHITEHORSE BYLAW 2022-43

A bylaw to amend Zoning Bylaw 2012-20

WHEREAS section 289 of the *Municipal Act* provides that a zoning bylaw may prohibit, regulate and control the use and development of land and buildings in a municipality; and

WHEREAS section 294 of the *Municipal Act* provides for amendment of the Zoning Bylaw; and

WHEREAS the zoning for Phases 12 and 13 of the Whistle Bend Subdivision was established as part of the future planning work for multiple phases, and detailed planning has indicated that certain changes are desirable with respect to various zones and zone boundaries; and


WHEREAS Phases 12 and 13 of Whistle Bend is vacant and all properties are owned by the Government of Yukon, thus minimizing the impact of zoning changes at this time; and


WHEREAS it is deemed desirable that the City of Whitehorse Zoning Bylaw be amended to establish new zoning for the area known as Whistle Bend Phases 12 and 13;


NOW THEREFORE the council of the municipality of the City of Whitehorse, in open meeting assembled, hereby ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. Section 10.6 of Zoning Bylaw 2012-20 is hereby amended by adding a new subsection 10.6.7 i) as follows:
 - "i) The 2.2-hectare area located south of Lots 542-548, Plan 2019-0003 LTO YT in the Whistle Bend area, is designated CM2x(i) with the special modification being that density for residential developments is limited to 30 units per hectare, applied per lot."
- 2. The zoning maps attached to and forming part of Zoning Bylaw 2012-20 are hereby amended by deleting the existing zoning for Whistle Bend Phases 12 and 13, located in the area adjacent to Casca Boulevard, and substituting therefore new zoning as indicated on Attachment "1" attached hereto and forming part of this bylaw.
- 3. For the purposes of clarity, a sketch showing the existing zoning for the Whistle Bend Phases 12 and 13 areas is attached hereto as Attachment "2" and forms part of this bylaw.
- 4. This bylaw shall come into force and effect upon the final passing thereof.

CITY OF WHITEHORSE BYLAW 2022-44

A bylaw to amend Maintenance Bylaw 2017-09

WHEREAS section 220 of the *Municipal Act* provides that council may by bylaw amend or vary bylaws; and

WHEREAS it is deemed desirable that the Maintenance Bylaw 2017-09 be amended to reflect changes required in accordance with the 2022 Snow and Ice Control Program Updates.

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the municipality of the City of Whitehorse, in open meeting assembled, hereby ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. Maintenance bylaw 2017-09 is hereby amended by deleting reference to Manager of Operations and replacing with Manager of Fleet and Transportation Maintenance throughout.
- 2. Maintenance bylaw 2017-09 is hereby amended by adding a new definition of sidewalk as follows:

"sidewalk" means that part of a highway which is paved or cement covered for use of, or ordinarily used by, pedestrians located in that part of a highway between the curb line, or edge of the roadway where there is no curb line, and the adjacent property line.

- 3. Maintenance bylaw 2017-09 is hereby amended by adding new clauses Section 23 through to Section 25 as follows:
 - 23. For the purposes of section 22, the owner or occupant of a property adjacent to sidewalk or lane crossing shall remove ice and snow from the sidewalk or lane crossing to a minimum width of 1.5 metres.
 - 24. Where the owner or occupier of a property has not complied with section 22, the City may remove the ice and snow as a service Council considers necessary or desirable for its residents, and the owner or occupier of the property is liable for such removal costs.
 - 25. Where the owner or occupier of a property fails to pay the expenses and costs of removal referred to in section 24, such costs may be added to the tax roll of the property.

4. Maintenance bylaw 2017-09 is hereby amended by replacing existing Section 23 with Section 26 as follows:

DISPOSAL ON ROADWAY PROHIBITED

- 26. No owner or occupier shall place snow, ice, dirt, debris or other materials from any accessible parking space, sidewalk, lane crossing, private property or driveway upon any other portion of a highway or public lands adjacent to a highway, unless they have obtained the prior written permission of the Manager of Fleet and Transportation Maintenance, or onto private property other than their own, unless they have obtained prior written permission from the private property owner.
- 5. Maintenance bylaw 2017-09 is hereby amended by renumbering Roof Snow Removal from Section 24 to Section 27 and further, renumbering all subsequent sections accordingly.
